Keep phase, neutral, and ground wires separated and avoid crossing wires unnecessarily. **Wiring Connections** Connect the phase (live) wires to the MCBs (Miniature Circuit Breakers) and the neutral wires to the neutral bus bar. Ground wires should be connected to the grounding bar. Ensure that each wire is stripped to the correct length and fully inserted into the terminal to avoid loose connections. **Label** each wire and breaker to identify the corresponding circuit for easier maintenance and troubleshooting. **Compliance and Inspection** Follow NEC, IEC, or local electrical codes for wire gauge, breaker sizing, and protection requirements.
